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- NSW Pony Club hosts the Pony Club Australia National Prince Phillip Mounted Games Championships (PPMG) in October 2022.
- PCA reached a large audience at Equitana
 Melbourne with a coaching demonstration,
 arena mounted games and stockman's challenge
 competitions and a display stand promoting
 Pony Club.
- Members are invited to make cards and email them to Pony Club UK to be displayed for the Queen during her Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Within a few months (Sept) the Queen passes away aged 96.

- Australia hosts an international Quiz online with five countries participating.
- We run a voluntary survey for female riding members 10-17 years about how periods affect their Pony Club experience. This later translates into allowing dark coloured jodhpurs for rallies, musters and some levels of competition.
- Catastrophic flooding events affect parts of South East Queensland, Victoria and the NSW east coast.
 It is hard to believe that 12 months earlier, we were all worried about Clubs threatened by the horrific Black Summer fires in several states.
- Pony Club members score well at the Modern Pentathlon National Championships, including Rhys Lanskey 1st senior male.

Message from the Chair

The 2022 year saw many challenges, including the ongoing effects of COVID-19, severe weather events, supply chain disruptions and labour shortages. Through it all PCA once again proved its resilience in managing these challenges and taking advantage of opportunities as they have arisen.

We continued to make good progress on our strategic plan, we launched our Horse Wellbeing Policy - a world first - and the National Safety Policy which included several adjustments to align with the needs of our communities far and close because nothing is more important than the health and safety of our horses and people.

We created another world first with the Pony Club International Alliance (PCIA) virtual competition for Showjumping and again offered an international virtual Dressage competition and Quiz. We applaud participants who worked hard to qualify and compete, and we thank the many wonderful volunteers and loved ones behind the scenes that enable our members to ride with pride and joy.

Importantly we took several steps to further strengthen our membership services and tighten our membership management systems. Significant work has continued with JustGo, including continued training and support. The work that has gone into this system over the past few years sets us up for the future and enables us to ensure we have the right information such as ensuring our children are being looking after by individuals with the appropriate credentials and that all relevant persons are captured for insurance requirements. This is providing peace of mind, compliance and good governance for clubs and states and feeds into the National Integrity Framework via Sport Australia that all sporting organisations must comply with.

We have a loss for this financial year. This is due to investment in our systems and our focus and determination to build and deliver systems, processes and opportunities that support Pony Club communities and welcome participation. Managing any loss while moving into a future with surplus is possible because we have the right people in our team to deliver on our strategic plan.

I would like to thank my fellow board directors who volunteer their time, contribute skills and passion to ensure Pony Club has a strong future. I'm grateful to our talented team of PCA staff and our wonderful





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and truly amazing CEO. I offer my heartfelt thanks and appreciation for all you do, your passion, ingenuity and teamwork that is delivering results, thank you. To our state representatives your combined diverse skills are generating positive results, so thank you for giving of your time. To zones, clubs, members, volunteers, and everyone that is part of Pony Club – thank you for all that you do and all that you give to our sport and community.

The changes in the operating environment, increased urbanisation and the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic are impacting Pony Club, with fewer people taking up horse riding as a sport. This lack of awareness also affects the 'social license' of horse sports.

Strategic priorities

Secure the sport's position as the leading horse sport organisation in Australia

Australia is the current Chair of the Pony
Club International Alliance (PCIA) and the
group, with representatives from the UK,
USA, Canada, Hong Kong, New Zealand,
Ireland and South Africa meets quarterly.
Major projects completed in 2022 included
benchmarking of the syllabus in each country and
the formation of the PCIA Youth Advisory Council to
elevate the voice of members.

Virtual competitions were conducted by PCIA in dressage, showjumping and quiz. The benefits of these events, enabling more riders to represent Australia in international competition, were welcomed.

The PCA National Safety Committee has representatives of state Pony Club associations and PCA. The value of the national Incident Reporting system is evident with more than 3000 reports received by the end of 2022. This data has enabled the analysis of the type, severity, circumstances and patterns of incidents.

Awards and recognition are an important program for PCA:

- Pony Club values unite us, and we were pleased to give awards to our Community Captains, Welfare Warriors and Sustainability Champions in 2022.
- PCA paid tribute to our volunteers during National Volunteer week and shared stories of the many contributions made by 'Committed Coaches', 'Event Organisers Extraordinaire', 'Helpful Handy Andy', 'Fabulous Fundraisers' and 'Officially Awesome' officials.
- The PCA Awards also recognised the best of the best riders, coaches and clubs. These are covered in more detail elsewhere in the Annual Report.

The PCA board received its governance report card from the Australian Sports Commission

and remains highly rated. The few items in the Governance Improvement Plan have been the focus of activity during 2022, such as documenting PCA's approach to roles and responsibilities across the organisation.

PCA appreciates the recognition and financial support of the Australian Sports Commission and looks forward to the introduction of the new participation funding model in 2024.

Deliver a strongly aligned sport nationally

The year started with a lot of work and focus on the replacement of the membership and events software with the JustGo platform. PCA appreciates the time of all involved, both in learning the new system and setting it up to best serve their community at the club, state and national level. Particular thanks to PCA's Sports Development Officer, Monil Shah, for managing the project.

The Safety Committee designed and supported the introduction of the Minimum Medical Services Framework which provides standards for competitive and non competitive events based on their risk profile. The implementation continues to be monitored and a minor revision was passed at the end of 2022 in response to data and feedback. PCA appreciates the support and feedback from the Pony Club community as we continue to address risks in horse sports.

The National Gear Rules were introduced after two years of deliberation by the National Gear Committee. Bronwyn Wheatley, who planned

to retire from PCA in 2021, continued to support the project through to delivery. Sally Wiseman, Participation and Development Manager, along with committee members Dianne Ould and Michael Carlson, assisted those riders seeking clarification or an exemption for use of particular items not included in the gear rules. The National Gear Rules will now move to an annual update.

The Club Support portal on the PCA website is growing with resources for marketing, risk management and integrity. The PCA website and YouTube channel now host recordings of the many webinars PCA delivered including inclusive coaching, bit fitting, insurance, horse welfare, archery, concussion management and more.

The national discipline committees in Tetrathlon and Mounted Games advanced the management of those sports through national collaboration. Following a review in 2022, the PCA board is refreshing other committees, with a goal of uniform national rules for common disciplines by the end of 2023.

Enhance the image and perception of Pony Club

The reach of PCA's social media channels continues to grow. Our strategy was recognised in a surprise article by Stu Williams from Shunt Creative on LinkedIn. Despite being a rule breaker and focussing on education-based posts, PCA was receiving engagement statistics six times the industry average for sporting organisations. The August 2022 PCA Facebook post on the 20 minute time limit for lungeing sessions reached more than 350,000 people globally.

Outside of the rider and coach syllabus, PCA's education offerings in 2022 included a new, free manual for lungeing, in addition to articles and resources on parasitology, nutrition and horse massage.

Sally Wiseman, with assistance from the PCA Education and Development Committee, completed the task of mapping the PCA rider syllabus to national Vocational Education and Training (VET) standards. Members seeking careers in the horse industry and enrolling in further study will be eligible for Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) from the PCA rider certificates they have completed.

Promotional campaigns in 2022 included:

- Hygain club rewards that saw dozens of clubs receive cash grants. Thanks Hygain
- The "We love Pony Club" video competition conducted by the Youth Advisory Council to celebrate the diversity of Pony Club and its members in Australia.
- PCA's presence at Equitana with a coaching demonstration, arena competition, display stand and the launch of PCA branded shirts, riding socks, hats and umbrellas.

PCA appointed its first Ambassador, Talicia
Beardsmore, in May 2022. Talicia has a strong
social media following, is an active NSW
competitor, and is employed in the horse
supplement industry whilst also riding track work
and training equestrian mounts.

Create opportunities for everyone to participate in horse sports

The diversity of riding disciplines in Pony Club is one of its strengths and this expanded in 2022 with the addition of horse archery. The Discipline of the Month series now has fifteen guides on the PCA website that clubs can use to incorporate additional activities into rallies and musters.

In conjunction with Thoroughbred Industry Careers, exhibition pony races were conducted at Warwick Farm, Moonee Valley and Scone.

Following the 2021 pilot, the first full intake of the PCA Leadership Certificate in February 2022 saw almost 20 members embark on a year long program of independent learning. The three modules of the Leadership Certificate are skill development, completion of a volunteer project and leadership practice in the Pony Club setting. PCA is grateful to the professionals that have given their time to support the program by running webinars and mentoring the participants.

PCA congratulates Morgan Lane (Vic) and Kaeleigh Brown (WA) for their appointment to the Pony Club International Alliance Youth Advisory Council. Having invested in developing leaders, it is important that Pony Clubs also appoint them to leadership positions.

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Two fundamental officials' programs were developed in response to feedback about the complexity and time commitment required to gain accreditations. Michelle Newham, PCA's Member Services Officer, drew on her grass roots Pony Club experience as a rider, parent and coach to develop these programs. The education material and assessment tools for the PCA Gear Checker Certificate are online, enabling self-paced learning and assessment at the local club level. The PCA Foundation Coach is now the first step in the PCA coach pathway, with a series of on-demand webinars, a low cost manual and online assessment tools.

The participation model for PCA now includes PCA Accredited Riding Centres for people without access to their own horse. The pathway from riding centre to horse ownership and club membership works best when there is on-the-ground cooperation between riding centres and local clubs. Disappointingly, there are still barriers due to resistance by local Pony Clubs to admit riding centre members to local events. PCA appreciates the foresight of those clubs that recognise this participation pathway and open their events.

PCA welcomes the increased number of clubs that are accepting adult members. This membership group has long been important in Queensland and South Australia and is expanding in other states. Pony Club offers a community environment, education program and lower-level competition that this group of members seek. It is an area of increased attention for PCA.

In conjunction with Dr Kirrilly Thompson from the University of Newcastle and collaborators, PCA conducted a survey of younger female members to investigate the impact of periods on participation in horse sports, and practical changes that could make a difference. The survey told us that changes in uniform rules to include dark coloured jodpurs, and improved bathroom facilities would be welcomed. This is now being incorporated into PCA National Gear Rules and PCA urges change in club, zone and state uniform options.

Develop an ethical framework for participants within the PCA environment

PCA adopted the new National Integrity Framework (NIF) in July 2022 which sees Sport Integrity Australia (SIA) now managing certain matters such as Child Safety and Member Protection. A new suite of integrity policies was launched based on the accepted national format from SIA.

Following a partial grant from SIA, Suanne Waugh was appointed to the position of PCA National Integrity Manager in July 2022. The focus of the first phase of implementation of the NIF has been Child Safety and all volunteers are required to do the Child Safety training. A range of free courses on aspects of the NIF are available.

The new PCA Horse Welfare Policy was launched in September 2022 and is the first time globally that an equestrian organisation has utilised the Five Domains model of animal welfare in such a policy. This model ensures that we consider both the elements necessary for survival (food, water, shelter, health care) and the interactions that contribute to a 'good life'. The policy provides advice on caring for your horse at home, as well as the rules that members must comply with at Pony Club competitions and activities.



Accredited Riding Centres



Accredited Riding Centres continue to prove popular with increased membership of riders this year, some new centres and over 100 PCA Syllabus Certificates assessed and presented to riders.

Floods in early 2022, particularly in Northern NSW and South East Queensland, affected some centres being able to conduct lessons in the second quarter, but all centres were fully operational by May again.

Congratulations to Phoenix Acres Riding Centre, awarded PCA Centre of the Year 2022. This innovative centre nominated teams and competed in their local gymkhanas, winning a March Past with their team.

Also showing great alignment with local Pony Club inclusion was Little Ranch Riding Centre in Casino, NSW, who held school holiday rider camps that welcomed all Pony Club members to attend.

Firefly Park Equestrian Centre focussed on training their NDIS rider, Amelia Van Leent, to compete in her first dressage competition, leading the way in inclusive coaching for riders.

Four Mile Farm in Queensland had two new coaches assessed and accredited through Pony Club Queensland and also had member riders compete in local showjumping competitions.

The centres continue to try to work with the states in growing opportunities for riders to compete.



2021 was a testament to the resilience, commitment and passion of our volunteers, members and staff, and with 2022 promising a return to normality, the year started at a rapid pace, and never slowed down.

The appointment of two additional staff members was welcomed by the team and the membership, providing some needed assistance during the introduction of the new database.



Early 2022 also saw the first AGM following the formation of PCV's inaugural board, who began the extensive process of establishing the required policies and procedures that will sit under our Rules of Incorporation.

With the hope of a full calendar of events coming true, the Board would like to recognise the efforts of the East Gippsland Zone for hosting our Dressage & Showjumping Championships, Mansfield PC for

hosting our State Horse Trials Festival, and the PCV organising committees that delivered the State Games, Flat & Musical Ride, Ride to Time and Tetrathlon Championships, and our Quiz and Prince Phillip Mounted Games events.

This year saw the introduction of several new national policies, and the new Victorian Child Safe Standards, all going live on July 1. Changes of this magnitude can be very unsettling, and we were committed to reducing any disruptions these changes could have and were happy to see that the impact was kept to a minimum.

Through consultation to date, we have identified the need to review our coach registration categories to ensure all coaches are appropriately engaged, supported and insured. It has also become apparent that many of our affiliates need assistance regarding their legal requirements as clubs and committees, and the general management of their organisations. Whilst we have already made a large number of online learning opportunities and digital

> resources available, we will be increasing this output in the year ahead, with an initial focus on Consumer Affairs requirements and Child Safety.

As 2022 came to an end, so did our current Strategic Plan. This has provided us with the opportunity to step back and reflect on all we have achieved in the recent trying years and envisage the future that we want to experience!

All that PCV has achieved this

year has been thanks to the tireless efforts of our riders, their families, our volunteers and our small team in the office. The Board would like to thank you all, especially those that donated extra time to contribute to the many committees PCV has to deliver Pony Club across our state.

Pony Club NSW also ran a well supported Advanced Instructors School in conjunction with camp so that coaches could experience the first class coaching. We were impressed with the riders' performances, behaviour and support of the staff, committee and volunteers to make this event a huge success.

We were lucky enough to get to run a few of our championships in 2022 which included:

Formal Gymkhana and Tetrathlon

Our Formal Gymkhana and Tetrathlon Championships were held in March in Zone 7 at Denman. 'Tet' is a growing discipline that is proving to excite many of our riders and every year sees growing numbers of entries into this event. We are excited to be holding more Tetrathlon Schools to educate and train our riders throughout the state in 2023.

State One Day Event and Combined Training

State ODE and Combined Training was held at Harden in Zone 2. Harden is also a long standing EA Horse Trials course and we are grateful for the opportunity to hold our championships there. Numbers were sound and we had some super hospitality from a wonderful country event.

Showjumping Championships

Show Riding

We have had many return and are looking forward to building on membership numbers in 2023 and competition entries as well as ensuring that our members are kept safe, supported and educated as best we can.

2023 has begun in the positive manner no major rain events so far and no COVID-19 outbreaks, we have big plans for 2023 and our state events. We kicked





off the year with State Camp and this was another huge success.

The State Office welcomed three new staff in 2022 which leads to more structure and development in the State. We are still proving to play catch up but we are now present and ticking off goals one at a time. We have launched a new Pony Club NSW monthly magazine called the PonE News which delivers our members the latest news, achievements, results and informative articles each month. We have started an educational Podcast where we chat to various vets, top riders and up and coming riders about veterinary topics, achievements and how to grow as a rider. We have developed a new website which has just been launched and we have restructured and developed a new coaching system for our NSW Coaches which is our Bronze Coaching Book (equivalent to old Prelim), the base level of beginning coaching in NSW.

We also need to acknowledge our fabulous representatives in our ZCIs and Zone Secretaries from each of our 27 Zones around the state who positively contribute to the organisation.

Western Australia



2022 started with a huge learning curve through the adoption of the JustGo Membership platform. Working with PCA and JustGo, club admins and staff attended a number of seminars, with extra information being circulated and assistance provided. The saturation approached worked well, with not just staff and club admins coming to grips, but also our members. It was a huge amount of work and heading into 2023 the work has paid off with most of our clubs and members enjoying a seamless transition into the new season.

The PCIA International Showjumping was held in 2022 with WA selected to host the Australian virtual leg. This was held at Dryandra in November 2022. The Australian team did very well against teams from the Hong Kong, New Zealand, South Africa and UK and it was an excellent learning experience for all riders involved.

Western Australians did very well in the 2022 Pony Club International Dressage with Lauren Rowe placing first in Class 2 (Novice) and Chenin Hislop who placed fourth in Class 1 (preliminary).

On the subject of technology. Pony Club WA continues to use

different technology platforms to our advantage. Our State high performance squads attended many training opportunities and performance reviews with the incredible use of zoom seminars. This innovative platform also saw our State Coaching Panel conduct leading PCA NCAS online Preliminary and Level 1 Coaching webinars. With the take up of online activity we have received better engagement with all members, coaches and officials especially in rural areas.

Our State Coaching School was conducted at Orange Grove Horse and Pony Club, with nearly 100 coaches around the state in attendance. They received coaching tips and took away expertise from other leading coaches and industry experts.

In the first year, our Ready2Ride Program was a huge success being taken up by around half of our clubs and attracting 142 members to this new category. It is worth noting that the majority of Ready2Ride members were brand new members, exactly what this program is aimed at. In short, Ready2Ride is designed for riders under eight years old and provides a half day structured program at club rallies. The program is aimed to appeal to younger riders and includes 31 pre-written coaching lessons available to coaches. Ready2Ride is noncompetitive and revolves around fun. Feedback so far as been very positive. Many thanks to Pony Club Victoria for sharing the program with us.

On the competition front, WA riders continued to impress with high profile performances.

Georgia Goss, a long time member and international competitor was selected in the PCA Inter Pacific team who travelled to New Zealand. The Aussies



finished 2nd to the USA team, with Canada 3rd and NZ 4th.

The PCIA International Showjumping was held in 2022 with WA selected to host the Australian virtual leg. This was held at Dryandra in November 2022. The Australian team did very well against teams from the Hong Kong, New Zealand, South Africa and UK and it was an excellent learning experience for all riders involved.

Western Australians did very well in the 2022 Pony Club International Dressage with Lauren Rowe placing first in Class 2 (Novice) and Chenin Hislop who placed fourth in Class 1 (preliminary).

It was a clean sweep for our Western Australian Mounted Games team who travelled to Canberra for the PPMG National Championship. WA took home both the Junior and Senior Championships titles.

Kaitlin Goss from Eastern Hills Horse and Pony Club represented Pony Club Australia in the 2022 International Quiz, with the Australian team finishing at a creditable 5th place to the UK.

Other achievements have been made throughout 2022 for WA members however we would also like to acknowledge our 'B' Proficiency Certificate holder from Eastern Hills Horse and Pony Club, Lucinda Boulter.

In 2022 Pony Club WA began working with our local First nations community to better acknowledge our Indigenous heritage across the state. An Indigenous art competition was conducted and our creative Eastern Hills Horse and Pony Club member Mikayla Woods produced inspiring artwork which took you on a on her personal journey at Pony Club and her connection to Country. The artwork was turned into an special edition State Indigenous polo shirt which was snapped up by members across the state in a flash! Mikayla's winning artwork also provided a show jump for her club where her journey has been featured on the jump wings.

Looking forward, 2023 will see a exciting Nationals year in WA! We are all looking very much forward the coming year were we hope to strive for a successful Nationals. This will be ran as a hybrid event. We are already receiving positive feedback from members both local and interstate.









China Pony Club

2022 is the third year of the epidemic in China. Most Chinese equestrian centres including CPC member clubs had difficulties in operation. They were affected by the epidemic control like all enterprises in the service industry and education/training industry. When the epidemic control at its most serious, they would even close temporarily, which led to deficit in most equestrian centres and Pony Clubs. The CPC office was also greatly affected. All CPC colleagues worked from home for two periods during the strict lockdown in 2022 for around three months. CPC activities in different places of China had also been postponed or cancelled many times.

Sadly the epidemic control measures in 2022 led to the permanent closure of six CPC clubsand, over the three years, to the closure of 13 China Pony Clubs in total.

CPC centres sometimes had to communicate through online meetings instead of meeting face to face with the domestic travel ban. In 2022, each CPC colleague attended about 50 online meetings.

Under such circumstances, CPC had made the following progress during 2022 in addition to providing regular member service, rider proficiency level tests, prelim coach training and tests:

- We held a Level One coach webinar for the first ever time with 17 experienced coaches participating;
- For the first time, CPC cooperated with a college (TAFE) to train their equestrian major students following Pony Club coach syllabus, and helped all the equestrian major graduates of 2022 find jobs in our member clubs (all Chinese Pony Clubs operate all the year round);
- More riders started to apply to take the C level rider test and some riders passed the C level test with excellent performances. Previously we only E-D* riders;
- 4. We held one gymkhana.


The good news is that at the beginning of December 2022, China finished the domestic pandemic control, and Chinese borders were gradually reopened after that.

- 3. Hold free Question and Answer webinars every two months to all CPC coaches to solve their questions about horse training, coaching and riding.
- 4. Provide PCA Foundation Coach accreditation in China
- 5. Provide PCA gear checker accreditation in China.

2022 is a year full of the spirit of perseverance and dedication of Pony Club. Many selfless contributions were made by CPC CPC colleagues and PCA coaches during difficult times. We thank all these people for making CPC full of warmth in this difficult year.



The financial report covers Pony Club Australia Ltd as an individual entity. Pony Club Australia Ltd is a Company, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The functional and presentation currency of Pony Club Australia Ltd is Australian dollars.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures , Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001.

These financial statements comply with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board.

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation and presentation of these financial statements are provided below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Company and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Revenue from contracts with customers

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Company expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

- 1. Identify the contract with the customer
- 2. Identify the performance obligations
- 3. Determine the transaction price
- 4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations
- 5. Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred

Generally the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Company have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of funds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

(a) Revenue and other income

Revenue from contracts with customers

Grant revenue

Where grant income arises from an agreement which is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations then the revenue is recognised when control of each performance obligation is satisfied.

Each performance obligation is considered to ensure that the revenue recognition reflects the transfer of control and within grant agreements there may be some performance obligations where control transfers at a point in time and others which have continuous transfer of control over the life of the contract.

Amounts arising from grants in the scope of AASB 1058 are recognised at the assets fair value when the asset is received. The Company considers whether there are any related liability or equity items associated with the asset which are recognised in accordance with the relevant accounting standard.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised when the outcome of the services can be measured reliably.

Membership fees

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the Membership can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Company.

Merchandise sales and affiliation fees

Merchandise sales and affiliation fees is recognised upon receipt.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Company is entitled to it.

(b) Income Tax

The Company is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(c) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(d) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Company classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss FVTPL

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Amortised cost

Assets measured at amortised cost are financial assets where:

- the business model is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

The Company's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Subsequent to initial recognition, these assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method less provision for impairment.

Interest income, foreign exchange gains or losses and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial assets through profit or loss

All financial assets not classified as measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income as described above are measured at FVTPL.

Net gains or losses, including any interest or dividend income are recognised in profit or loss.

(d) Financial instruments

Financial assets

Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for the following assets:

financial assets measured at amortised cost

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial assets has increased significant since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Company considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Company's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Company uses the presumption that an asset which is more than 30 days past due has seen a significant increase in credit risk.

The Company uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when:

- the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Company in full, without recourse to the Company to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or
- the financial assets is more than 90 days past due.

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

Trade receivables

Impairment of trade receivables have been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses. The Company has determined the probability of non-payment of the receivable and multiplied this by the amount of the expected loss arising from default.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Company renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

Other financial assets measured at amortised cost

Impairment of other financial assets measured at amortised cost are determined using the expected credit loss model in AASB 9. On initial recognition of the asset, an estimate of the expected credit losses for the next 12 months is recognised. Where the asset has experienced significant increase in credit risk then the lifetime losses are estimated and recognised.

(d) Financial instruments

Financial liabilities

The Company measures all financial liabilities initially at fair value less transaction costs, subsequently financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

The financial liabilities of the Company comprise mainly of trade and other payables.

(e) Intangibles

Patents and trademarks

Patents and trademarks are recognised at cost of acquisition. Patents and trademarks have a finite life and are carried at cost less any accumulated amortisation and any impairment losses. Patents and trademarks are amortised over their useful life of 10 years.

Website

The website is amortised over a 5 year period.

Amortisation

Amortisation is recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of intangible assets, from the date that they are available for use.

Amortisation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(g) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(h) Adoption of new and revised accounting standards

The Company has adopted all standards which became effective for the first time at 31 December 2022, the adoption of these standards has not caused any material adjustments to the reported financial position, performance or cash flow of the Company.

Key estimates - receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.
